Core Country Update

Our core country programs in Africa and the Pacific continue to champion small-holder farmers to improve their nutrition, health and livelihoods.

Ethiopia

In October, the Kyeema Ethiopia team hosted two impactful webinars on One Health principles. The first, led by Dr. Aklilu Feleke, emphasized the importance of a holistic approach to combat zoonotic diseases. The second, featuring Dr. Tenaw Tadeg, tackled antimicrobial resistance, sharing strategies for reducing resistant infections.

Both webinars attracted diverse audiences and have since been viewed by over 200 individuals on our Telegram channel, spreading critical knowledge and inspiring community action. These initiatives underscore our commitment to building healthier, more resilient communities through education and empowerment.

Mozambique

Meet Isac Mondlane, a 24-year-old entrepreneur from Mali village, who transformed his family's poultry farm into a thriving business. In 2022, Isac's mother received 30 Boschveld chicks through a project supporting vulnerable women. When she passed the responsibility to him in 2023, Isac embraced the opportunity and grew the business remarkably.

Today, Isac sells around 125-day-old chicks monthly and has earned significant income from egg sales and poultry products.

Leveraging social media and investing in technology like a 504-egg capacity incubator, he's built a strong community reputation.

With plans to expand his facilities, Isac exemplifies the power of local initiatives in creating sustainable livelihoods.



Papua New Guinea

New Beginnings in Hall Sound Bay
The team recently held a soft launch for the upcoming 'Building Resilient Communities through Marine Restoration and Alternative Livelihoods' project, funded by the Pacific America Fund. This initiative, in partnership with the Yule Island Community Women's Association, focuses on climate adaptation, marine restoration, and sustainable livelihoods.

The launch, attended by community leaders and Hon. Peter Isoaimo, sparked excitement for the project's start in 2025. We're eager to bring you more updates as activities progress.

Pacific Regional

Pacific Regional:

In October, our Program Manager, Annelise, conducted her six-monthly field visits to Pacific program countries. Collaborating with community teams, she introduced a new Google-based monitoring tool to streamline data collection in real-time.

Preliminary plans are underway for a formal study which will use the data collected by the test sites established under the program to compare results of the corals propagated using the heat-tolerant coral restoration techniques developed by Dr. Austin Bowden-Kirby with other corals after a bleaching event to test the efficiency of the heat-tolerant community restoration model.
